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

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Faith atters

On Islam's Theology, In Five Minutes

That a great honor it was to answer a reach-out call made by publisher Lori Cornell for an invitation to submit an article. Jamestown Islamic Society is a local non-profit organization that focuses on promoting local charitable work, education, and community service while attending to the spiritual and religious needs of local Muslim families. Muslim community members have called Chautauqua County their home since the early 1900's, starting with families who arrived in the area from Albania. Other families from all walks of life moved to the area later on at various times. Some have stayed, others moved on to other localities. Other than the local Muslim-American families from European heritage, countries like Egypt, Iraq, Palestine, Jordan, India, Pakistan, Lebanon and Kosovo have been part of the history and fabric of Chautauqua County. The most current arrivals are from Iraq, Jordan, Palestine, Syria, Lebanon, Cambodia and the Democratic Republic of the Congo due to current political conflicts in those regions.

Jamestown Islamic Society, Inc., was formally established around 1986. It was, and still is, managed by a dedicated team of volunteers. Giving back to the community has no limits. Through education, volunteering, and direct material assistance to qualifying families JIS members often help as much as they're able to. On many occasions, giving back to our local community might be by conveying accurate information about our own faith, Islam, whenever invited to present on the topic.

Once in a while around the holiday season, a friend or a co-worker may ask about or start a conversation related to Islam and/or the Muslim culture, holidays, or celebrations. Most of the

time, the conversation would expand by moving into a discussion about the origins of the human family starting with Adam and Eve. Then, the family stories of Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Ishmael, Moses, Jesus, and Mohammad, may Peace and Allah's Blessings be onto them, are all considered prophets in the Islamic culture and faith. These prophets and messengers were among an estimated twenty-four thousand prophets and messengers who were chosen by Allah (Arabic for "God") to deliver a message to their people: "worship the One and Only God/Allah; and ascribe no partners, family, or relatives to him." The first pillar of Islam states that: "there is no deity worthy of worship except the One and Only God/Allah, and that Muhammad and all prophets before him are all messengers of God/Allah." This statement of faith was taught and used by each of God's/(Allah) prophets and messengers in their own respective languages, in some form or another. Muslim practitioners may confirm their belief by reciting the statement of belief verbally, learn its true meaning, and remain steadfast and sincere in abiding by it in practice. Therefore, the statement of belief is considered so important and that, once a person is confirmed as a believer, he/she may receive salvation based on that.

"Allah" is an Arabic reference that means the "one and only deity." In the Arabic language, every word that exists has a three-letter root. The word "Islam" is derived from the Arabic language root word "Silm," (pronounced: S-i-l-m) which literally means "peace." Therefore, the term "Islam" can be easily defined as "to peacefully believe in the One and only God/Allah.

There are two sources of knowledge in Islam. First, the Glorious "Quran" which is Islam's holy book. The Quran contains the literal words of God/ (Allah) that were revealed through the holy spirit, the Angel Gabriel in a form of verses and chapters to the prophet Muhammad over the span of twenty-three years. In the Quran, Allah God/(Allah) spoke about the history of mankind from the creation of Adam and Eve. Some chapters in the Quran contain God's/(Allah's) laws and legislations for humanity to live by, should they desire to live a wholesome life and enter paradise on judgement day. Other chapters in the Quran contain narratives, examples, stories of other nations from history. Many Quran chapters contain prayers,

supplications, and future prophecies to consider.

The second source of knowledge on Islam is the life example of the Prophet Muhammad himself, may Allah's peace and blessings be unto him. The authentic and verified compilation of what the prophet had taught, his speech, and his ways of all aspects of life are what's known in the Muslim world as "Sunnah" (Arabic for "the proper path").

Islam offers its practitioners two holy day celebrations. The first one is to mark an ending to the fasting season. This takes place on the day immediately following the last day of Ramadan, the month of fasting, when Muslims fast from food and drink daily from dawn until sunset for twenty-nine or thirty consecutive days. It's a celebration for ending the fasting season.

The second holy day is to mark an ending to the pilgrimage season. Able Muslims individuals must travel once in a lifetime to the city of Mecca in Saudi Arabia to participate in memorializing events and actions that took place during the life of the prophets Abraheem and his son Ashmael. That holy day usually ends with scarifying a lamb and distributing its meat to friends and less fortunate families.

As Muslim-American communities across the nation learn about the traditional American culture and norms, one major American holiday that everyone looks forwards to and enjoys is Thanksgiving. "Halal" Turkeys have become popular in many Muslim communities in the United States. Locally speaking, we, along with many New Neighbor refugee families, have been so lucky to be able to participate in the community Thanksgiving dinner and celebration that St. Luke's church held in the past couple of years. For that, we give many Thanks to Fr. Luke Fodor and the St. Luke's Church congregation for all their dedication, hard work, and generosity for an outstanding Thanksgiving dinner and festivities they have done during this year and last year's Thanksgiving. We hope to continue this awesome and unique community multi-faith, multi-denomination, collaboration on this and other community programs moving forward.

In the end, more than anything, not only is Islam considered to be as a spiritual faith that's practiced by about one fifth of today's world population, but also it is a unique life-style, a way of life, that can be applied to all day-to-day living. For a dedicated practitioner, Islam's unaltered and unadulterated laws, guidelines and practices demand loyalty, discipline, sincerity, truthfulness and devotion to the one and only Creator, Allah, and his last prophet/messenger Muhammad. Islam's main theology and practices can't be changed or altered to fit human desires. But, as a matter of fact, Islam requires its followers to do their best to change or adjust their human desires in order to conform to Islam's practices and theology. Since

the founding of Islam around the sixth century, history is filled with many critics who tried to discredit the faith or some of its practices due to actions of certain Muslim groups or individuals. Some critics may either have lack of knowledge of context, misunderstanding, or sometimes just plain intentional political spinning, hatred, bigotry, stereotyping, and/or in some other cases, the feeling of being threatened due to personal insecurity in the presence of "Muslim" individuals around them.

Just like any other human being, a Muslim individual is fallible and liable to fall for "Satan's whimpering" and do sinful deeds. Islam provides many paths and effective ways for repentance and forgiveness. In an ideal Muslim community, good practicing Muslims are known to not eat pork nor drink alcohol. A practicing Muslim is supposed to follow basic life rules, for example:

"Do no harm to self; and do no harm to others." *also,* "One shall not attain perfect faith until he/she love for his fellow human being what he loves for him/herself." *and* "Speak of goodness or remain silent." "Honor thy parents." "Protect and preserve the rights of your neighbor."

Good practicing and faithful Muslims are expected to be lawabiding, respectful, and dedicated people anywhere they live and with whomever they interact with.

this is a time for joy. Now let us all sing together, of: peace, peace, peace on earth."

The sound of the music filled the auditorium. The soft light of candles gave off a glow that was unearthly. The conductor led us around and around, until all gathered joined in the song of **PEACE**.

I still remember how singing a song about peace in the community felt. Peace shows up where we least expect it - if we take steps to cultivate it.

In Madeline L'Engle's book, "A Swiftly Tilting Planet", she writes about the human responsibility to seek peace in the world saying...

"...You know my dears, the world has been abnormal for so long that we've forgotten what it's like to live in a peaceful and reasonable climate. If there is to be any peace or reason, we have to create it in our own hearts and homes."

L'Engle's call for human responsibility in efforts of peace, isn't the only place I find it. In the gospel reading from Luke 1 (for the second week of Advent) asks people to take action to create **PEACE** with the

help of John the Baptist..

The North American Management Society (NALMS) recognized John Jablonski III of Lakewood, NY with its "Lake Management Success Story Appreciation Award" for his accomplishments with Chautauqua Watershed Conservancy, at the International Symposium of the Society at South Lake Tahoe, CA/ NV on November 7th.

Each year, members from the North American Lake Management Society community nominate their peers for a variety of awards to highlight achievements in lake management and service to NALMS. Nominations are reviewed, and a winner is selected for each award by the board of directors. At the awards session, Michelle Balmer, spokesperson of the awards committee stated, "John has been the visionary and passionate co-founder who conceptualized and led the creation of the Chautauqua Watershed Conservancy, Inc. in New York State, serving as its first president in 1990 and then executive director for 30 years. Under John's remarkable tenure, the conservancy succeeded in protecting over 1,200 acres of woodlands, wetlands, shorelands, and waterways in the Chautauqua area and creating 33 local nature preserves, all of which are open to the public for outdoor recreation, enjoyment, and refreshment."

"Notably, John drafted grants and proposals facilitating State investments of over \$9.5 million (such as the Cheney and Stow Farm Lakeshores, as well as Midway Park) to conserve local open space and outdoor recreation assets and has conceptualized, packaged, and/ or facilitated multiple watershed land conservation and water quality projects across Chautauqua County.





Over two miles of the Chautauqua Lake shoreline and Lake Outlet were conserved through his efforts. His long-time leadership, strategic planning, technical expertise, and passion for the natural world have greatly benefited our community in myriad ways. Now widely recognized and regarded for its promotion of best practices in land, wildlife, and water resource management, the Conservancy has helped inspire countless others to better understand and appreciate the connection between ecologically healthy waters and habitats, healthy people, higher quality of life, and the economic prosperity of the Chautauqua region."

Although John stepped down from the executive director position in 2023, he continues to serve the Conservancy and lake community as the Conservancy's Special Projects Coordinator, focusing on impactful habitat and waterway conservation and restoration projects. John also continues to serve on the board of the New York State Federation of Lake Associations (NYSFOLA). He holds degrees in Natural Resources from Cornell University and Urban and Regional Planning from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, with a concentration in water resources. He is an avid fisherman and boater on Chautauqua Lake and other waters and an enthusiastic advocate for healthy recreational waterways, people, and wildlife.

Christmas Trees and Their Origins

The Christmas tree is also known as the Yule tree. The most common types of Christmas trees are evergreens like spruce, pine or fir. The Norway spruce is considered the traditional Christmas tree and has been popular since Victorian times.

Each year, 33 to 36 million Christmas trees are grown in America with 50-60 million in Europe. In 1998, there were about 15,000 growers in America (a third of them "choose and cut" farms). In that same year, it was estimated that Americans spent \$1.5 billion on Christmas trees. By 2016, the amount had climbed to \$2.04 million for natural trees and a further \$1.86 billion for artificial trees. In Europe, 75 million trees worth \$3.2 billion are harvested annually. In the past, Christmas trees were often harvested from wild forests, but now almost all are commercially grown on tree farms. They are cut after about ten years of growth and new trees are planted.

The most commonly purchased tree is the Noble Fir tree which has the benefit of not shedding needles as well as retaining good foliage color and scent. Some trees, frequently referred to as "living Christmas trees" are sold live with roots and soil often from a plant nursery to be stored at nurseries in planters or planted later outdoors and enjoyed (often decorated) for years or decades.

Christmas trees have been sold commercially in the United States since about 1850. Franklin Pierce, the 14th president is often credited with bringing the Christmas tree tradition to the White House in the early 1850s. In 1912, what were likely the first major community Christmas trees in the United States were erected in Boston, New York City and Hartford, Connecticut.

In 1923, President Calvin Coolidge started the National Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony. Since 1966, the National Christmas Tree Association has given a Christmas tree to the

President and First Family.

is the one appearing each year in Rockefeller Center. This tree dates back to the Depression Era with the first tree placed in 1931. It was a small unadorned tree set up by construction works at the center of the construction site. Two years later, another tree was placed there, this time with lights. These days, the giant Rockefeller Center tree is laden with over 50,000 Christmas lights. The tallest tree displayed at Rockefeller Center arrived in 1999. It was a Norway Spruce that measured 100 feet fall and hailed

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
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Frewsburg Leo Club Celebrates 25th Anniversary


O'Reilly and Rappole Represent Local Rotary Clubs at Rotary District 7090 Foundation Luncheon in Canada



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Langworthy Helps Lead Bipartisan Effort Urging FAA to Prioritize Air Traffic Control Modernization

Aviation Safety Caucus Co-chairs Congressman Nick Langworthy (NY-23), Jack Bergman (MI-01), and Marc Veasey (TX-33) have urged Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Administrator Michael Whitaker to address serious concerns regarding the agency's oversight of Air Traffic Control (ATC) modernization investments in a recent letter.

This communication comes in response to a recent Government Accountability Office (GAO) report that found over half of the FAA's 138 Air Traffic Control systems to be unsustainable or at

"The continued safety and efficiency of our national airspace system depend on robust oversight, timely execution, and effective management of these critical investments," the lawmakers wrote.

The letter continues, "Although the FAA has made strides in identifying and investing in some aging ATC systems, stronger and more proactive oversight is needed to ensure these investments are implemented efficiently. The oversight council responsible for reviewing and monitoring these



projects has, in many instances, failed to consistently assess highrisk factors associated with ATC modernization. Without proper and timely oversight, significant modernization projects are not meeting their cost, schedule, and performance goals, putting the entire system at risk of further operational disruptions."

The letter recommends that the FAA strengthen its acquisition oversight council to ensure thorough evaluations of project plans and risks, establish clear processes for annual budget reviews to enhance transparency and accountability, and collaborate with air traffic controllers and aviation experts to integrate operational expertise improve modernization outcomes.

The letter has also received from outside support organizations, including National Air Traffic Controllers Association (NATCA), the Air Line Pilots Association (ALPA), the International Brotherhood of Teamsters (IBT), and the Association of Flight Attendants-CWA, among others.
