Baseball has been an integral part of the fabric of the Jamestown community since at least 1866.

It may have begun with a local high school student, Clinton B. Winsor, pulling together a group of guys to play a relatively new, uniquely American game. The Civil War had ended just a year earlier when Winsor created a team he dubbed the Unknowns. People came to

watch them play. Other dedicated individuals would soon go on to organize teams and organizations throughout Chautauqua County.

The first professional baseball team appeared in Jamestown in 1890.



Jamestown Baseball has been significant to the community for many decades, with the Majestic Russell E. Diethrick Jr. Park established in 1941. Baseball in this city dates back to the 1890s, where it was played at Celeron Park and Allen Park before Diethrick Park was even conceived. Jamestown has been affiliated with professional baseball teams such as the Pittsburgh Pirates, Detroit Tigers, St.



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

through the gates at Diethrick Park.

Tucker Fenton, a right-handed pitcher for the Jamestown Tarp Skunks in his second season with the team, is a local talent who graduated from Maple Grove High School and has played baseball at St. Bonaventure University for the past two seasons. He stated in an interview, "Playing for the Skunks is very special to me. It feels like home; I grew up playing at Diethrick. The fans are the best part for me. Playing under the lights with the fans cheering you on is great. The history of the park is very notable, with Stanton and many other great players having played here."

In Jamestown, baseball is a passion shared by the entire city. From April, when high school teams play their sectional playoffs, to late May when the Tarp Skunks take the field to begin their collegiate summer season before returning to school in August, baseball remains a central focus of the community. Jamestown has also been home to many Babe Ruth World Series events. Dietrich Park hosted the first-ever Babe Ruth 13-year-old World Series in 1980 and continues to play a role, having hosted the event's most recent World Series in August 2023.

The Jamestown Tarp Skunks, who are currently in the four spots for the west division of the Perfect Game Collegiate Baseball League, are thriving under their new coach and enjoying the historic atmosphere of their stadium. The firstyear head coach, Ben Julian, shared in an interview, "The community has just been amazing. The ballpark is historic, beautiful, and well-maintained. The organization bringing the schools here today with the kids greatly supports our team and shows how much the community cares. Everyone, from the top to the bottom of the organization, has been amazing."

June 6 saw the biggest attendance on a kid's day for the Skunks, with 2,754 people in attendance. The kids were mostly watching the game and excited to see their favorite Skunks take the field. They lined up, waiting for their favorite snacks from the concession stand, hoping to catch a foul ball, or even purchase one from the fan shop to get it signed later after the game.

The Tarp Skunks have one of the best front offices in the Perfect Game Collegiate Baseball League, creating innovative events like "Strike Out Cancer Night," where the team raffles off pink Tarp Skunks jerseys and donates the proceeds to cancer research. Other events include Fireworks Night, in collaboration with Children's Solutions, and First Responders Night, where all tickets are free, and first responders are honored, and presented by Live CHQ. Additionally, the Tarp Skunks organize an instructional kids camp and Library Night with a Wiffy bookmark giveaway.

Another Tarp Skunks player, Bobby Stang from Georgia Southern University,

who is transferring to Dayton in the fall, is a utility player and fan favorite. He is currently on a four-game hit streak with one home run for the Skunks. Stang shared, "The fans are the part I love the most. Every night they bring great energy and make it fun to play the game. With their endless support, it makes it easier to play relaxed. Also, the group of guys I am surrounded with couldn't be any better. Every guy on our team plays 110% every game, which makes it much easier to win. Our goals as a team are to go out there and win every game we can. Every guy on our team has been working every day to be the best version of themselves. I think this year's team is something special, and we could make a great run."

Lastly, Brady Wright, a starting righthanded pitcher from Santa Fe CC, shared his thoughts: "It's been a great experience. We have the best fans in the country out here. I love to come out here and play in front of them every day we can and just try to win games. It's a special culture out here, man. I love it out here."

The Tarp Skunks are looking to bring home another championship Jamestown, having last won the Collegiate Baseball League Championship in 2018. While they have come close in recent years, they have ultimately fallen just short. This season, they aim to bounce back with new coaching and some fresh faces on the roster. Be sure to check them out as they progress further into the season with new events at every ball game with great fan experience for kids and adults.

Kameron Melendez is an intern with

the Jamestown Tarp Skunks and the Salamanca Lizards. He is a rising senior in the Sports Media program at St. Bonaventure University and serves as the editor and writer of Getting Stinky. A Jamestown native, Melendez has been around the ballpark his whole life, playing baseball for Jamestown Community College, Jamestown High School, The Northeast Twins Travel Organization, and the Babe Ruth League.

His love for sports and the game of baseball came from his grandfather, Tom Fisher, who was a coach for many years in Jamestown for the Southside Blue Devils football team and the Babe Ruth League, where he served as a commissioner for years. Melendez's goal is to help kids get the exposure they need to play at the next level and to create memories for everyone by sharing videos on social media or writing articles.




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


Here's How It Works:

Annual Yassou Festival Highlights Greek Culture and Orthodox Faith

For over 30 years every Father's Day weekend, the St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church in Jamestown, NY has put on our annual Yassou Festival. The event is a celebration of the Greek culture, especially with the cuisine and beverages offered, the authentic live Greek music, traditional dancing and most especially the hospitality. The word "Yassou" is a multi-purpose term with a literal translation of "your health" in English and is used to wish good health upon a person. Sometimes, in informal settings, "Yassou" may be used to make a toast in the same way Americans say "cheers".

The Yassou Festival is both an annual fundraiser for the St. Nicholas parish, as well as an invitation from all our parishioners to the surrounding community in opening the doors of our spiritual home to our neighbors in fellowship.

The St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church proclaims the Christian faith of the New Testament, drawing her beliefs and practices directly from the early Christian Church as taught by Jesus Christ and His apostles to the world. Our humble parish was founded in 1922 largely by Greek and Albanian immigrants who brought their faith to the New World. Today, the parish is comprised of both cradle Orthodox Christians, as well as those who were received from other faith traditions. We have grown from Greek and Albanian families to include members from many backgrounds including Ukrainian, Russian, Romanian and American. One does not have to be Greek to be Orthodox, and our services are done almost entirely in English. The Orthodox faith is unified in doctrine meaning that Orthodox Christians have the same beliefs regardless of language or ethnicity.

People who visit an Orthodox church and learn about her teachings find that there is much in common with other Christian faith traditions. However, there are some significant differences. Regardless of these differences, the Church teaches that we are all to love one another, to have patience, kindness and forgiveness in our hearts.

The parish warmly invites all to come visit and experience our culture and hospitality. In addition to food, music, dancing, and a bazaar, the parish will be conducting tours of the church twice a day on Friday June 13th and Saturday June 14th.

We hope to see you there and to say "Yassou"!

Episode 2: Billy, Baseball and Father's Day

Ever since the release of his first charting hit, "Piano Man" in November 1973, I've been a huge Billy Joel fan. I first had the chance to see him live in concert at the "Aud" in Buffalo on November 7, 1979. Clearly, that was a night to remember. Together with my girlfriend Becky and more than 16,000 of our "closest friends," we provided the vocal back up as Billy performed his greatest tunes.

Fast forward more than four decades. After hundreds of hits, thousands of sold out concerts and a Hall of Fame career for Billy, (along with a pretty good life for me too), I had the chance to fulfill one of the items on my personal "bucket list." This one is ranked right up there with visiting all 50 states (DONE!) and watching all of the 30 major league baseball teams play games in their home parks (which I'm about two thirds of the way on that one).

While over the years, I've attended dozens of big name shows, including additional Billy Joel concerts, I never had the chance to see him and his world class band during his monthly, decade long, sold out residency at Madison Square Garden, the world's most famous arena. Well, that all changed last month when Becky, now my wife of 40 years, and I went to the Garden and were finally able to cross that one off my list.

To say the show was amazing and met my lofty expectations, would be one of life's all-time understatements. But what was also gratifying and heart-warming was the reaction and response from more than 20,000 of our "closest friends and family members" that filled the Garden that night. I still can't forgetthe young boy (who couldn't have been more

than 13 or 14 years old) sitting next to us, along with the older gentleman, in his late 70's or early 80's, who appeared to be his grandfather. Both of them seemed to know every word to every song and weren't bashful about demonstrating it, much to our delight. At the end of the show, arm in arm and swaying back and forth to the music, they celebrated an early Father's Day together, belting out the lyrics with Billy to "Piano Man."


That evening brought back a flood of memories about attending events as a boy with my father and then with my own sons during their younger years. Unlike our two friends at the Garden, however, my experiences centered around going to a variety of sporting events.

There were those trips with my Dad to see our Bills, first to the "Old Rockpile," War Memorial Stadium at Jefferson, Best and Dodge in Buffalo and then to the flashy new Rich Stadium in the suburbs. There were our visits to the "Aud" in Downtown Buffalo for Sabres hockey games and Braves basketball. Yes, Buffalo actually had an NBA team in the 70's (and a pretty good one at that,) before they broke my teenage heart and relocated to Southern California (now the Los Angeles Clippers.) And, then there were the annual treks to old Cleveland Municipal Stadium to see our Yankees play. If we were really lucky and the schedule gods complied, we would enjoy the ultimate fatherson bonding experience, a Sunday Double Header. Yes, scheduled Sunday double-headers were still a thing, well into the 70's.

While those out of town events were all wonderful and memorable, what really stands out in my mind were our evenings together right here in JTOWN at College Stadium, (now Diethrick Park), taking in Falcons, Expos and Jammers minor league baseball games. For me, and I would suspect for my Dad as well, every moment we spent together the"Falconer Street Ball Yard" was Father's Day.

That tradition continued and only grew when

Juneteenth

Juneteenth, or, Juneteenth National Independence Day, is the first new federal holiday since Martin Luther King, Jr. day was adopted in 1983. The holiday was recognized by act of Congress and signed into law by President Joe Biden on June 17, 2021. The holiday commemorates the day in June 1865 When Major General Gordon Granger issued his proclamation, known as General Order 3, officially declaring the end of slavery in Texas. Gordon had assumed command of the District of Texas after the Civil War. His responsibilities included enforcing the provisions of the Emancipation Proclamation and overseeing the federal government's Reconstruction program. He arrived in the city of Galveston on June 19 and, since, the day has been referred to appropriately as Juneteenth.

General Order 3 reads as follows:

The people of Texas are informed that, in accordance with a Procla-

mation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. This involves an absolute equality of rights, and rights of property, between former master and slaves, and the connectionheretofore existing between them becomes that of employer and free laborer.

The Freedmen in Texas celebrated the day one year later on June 19, 1866. Celebrations quickly spread throughout the South and, eventually, largely due to Northern migration, across the country.

Juneteenth celebrations today are generally local affairs. Festivals are characterized, much as in the early days, by music food, joy and historical pride. Jamestown Juneteenth is every bit a part of that tradition. The day has been celebrated in Jamestown for more than twenty-five years. The festival has evolved in recent years to become a major cultural event. The Juneteenth Planning Committee is delighted and wishes to express gratitude to the many individuals, businesses and foundations who make possible the annual event. Such support allows the committee to award scholarships to graduating seniors bound for

Festival Italia will be held at the Beaver Club in Fredonia (Jun 22), Great Blue Heron Festival in Sherman (July 5-7), St James Italian Festival (July 20th), Westfield Arts and Crafts Festivals in Westfield (July 26-27), and the Lucille Ball Comedy Festival (Aug 1-4.)

We live in farm country and there are so many ways we can enjoy and appreciate this part of our community. There are organized morning walks in vineyards along the lake, the Chautauqua County Fair (July 16-21) and farmers markets throughout the county starting in June. Jamestown Public Market (Sat 10-2), Dunkirk Farmer's Market (Weds 9-2), Fredonia Farmer's Market (Sat 9-1), Lakewood Farmers & Artisans' Market (Thurs 10-2), Forestville Farmers Market (Fri 2-6), Westfield Farmers & Artisan Market (Sat 9-2) and Mayville Farmers & Artisans' Market (Thurs 11-5). In addition to fresh fruits, vegetables, local honey and maple syrup, many of our artisan neighbors display and sell local handmade items at these markets. A great way to find a special gift for yourself or a friend.

And don't forget all the permanent attractions we have to enjoy in Chautauqua County like our county parks and trails, several lakes, Chautauqua Gorge, Panama Rocks, Roger Tory Peterson Institute, the Audubon, the National Comedy Center, Lucy Desi Museum, Fredonia Opera House, and of course Chautauqua Institution. If cost is an issue look for the community days on their schedule. Chautauqua Institute has free Sunday admission, or ask if they honor the "Museums for All" discount for people who have a SNAP card. If a lack of transportation is holding you back from enjoying these call CHQ Transit formerly CARTS at (716) 665-6466. Many of these venues have special arrangements with CHQ Transit during special event for people who don't have their own transportation and ask about their senior discount.

Many places around the county are hosting free outdoor musical entertainment or movies, open to the public, like Friday night movies in Clymer Town Park, Thursday nights music on the Pier in Dunkirk, and Free Sunday admission at Chautauqua Institution which usually features musical entertainment at the amphitheater. My Yiayia (grandmother) is very important to our family and our church family. She is always there to bake and serve at the festival bakery, and she has taught me to provide great customer service. She loves to greet all the visitors and catch up with friends who she's seen there for decades.

My grandparents, George and Kathy Theofilactidis, have shown their children and grandchildren how much they love St. Nicholas Church. In so many ways, they have supported the church and its community. George, my Pappou (grandfather), used his woodworking talents to care for and beautify our church, and he even contributed to the Yassou décor by cutting all the wooden Greek dancers that hang throughout the tent. He was chairman of the festival in the early years, too. He passed away in December of 2023, but his memory will live on in our Father's Day Weekend celebration, particularly on the dance floor where he loved to be.

Dancing is one of my favorite parts of the festival, too! I take pride in wearing the traditional Amalia costume, and performing the dances alongside my two brothers and all of my cousins. Being a part of the festival is truly one of the most amazing experiences ever! It brings people together and provides a chance to make lifelong memories with friends and family. Yassou is such a big part of my life, and I hope it always will be!

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

Take Me Out to the Ball Game

Take me out to the ball game are familiar words set to an original Tin Pan Alley song, by that title, heard in baseball stadiums across America. The words are as familiar as "baseball, hot dogs, apple pie and Chevrolet". In 1974, James Hartzell conceived the quoted phrase which became the basis of one of the most iconic car ads of all time. The term, Tin Pan Alley, was a collection of music publishers and songwriters in New York City who dominated the popular music of the United States in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. These publishers and songwriters paved the way

for what would become the Great American Songbook.

When baseball arrives season whether cheering favorite major league team or minor league team we are encouraged to take a break and sing along to the words of a song that has become baseball's anthem during the game's seventh-inning stretch. Some ballparks replace the words, home team, with their hometown team. The song includes the words, "cracker jack" which was a molasses-flavored, caramel-coated popcorn peanuts treat with a small prize inside each 1 oz. box. It became an instant hit when introduced at the 1893 Chicago World's Fair by a local popcorn company. They were first sold at some ballparks in 1907. Once the product was inexplicably linked with baseball in the song lyrics, sales of the crunchy concoction skyrocketed.

The Cracker Jack name and

slogan, "The More You Eat The More You Want" were registered in 1896.

In every sense, Take Me Out to the Ball Game is in the words of the late Chicago Cubs Hall of Fame broadcaster, Harry Caray "a song that reflects the charisma of baseball". The song written in 1908 by Jack Norworth and Albert Von Tilzer makes the game even more magical by raising your voice and becoming part of it. This musical work, affectionately referred to over the years as the "other" national anthem has become baseball's grand-slam! It has been ranked in survey polls as one of the top ten songs of the twentieth century and is second only to "Happy Birthday".

Baseball has deep roots in Jamestown with the Jamestown Falcons dating back to the late 1930s. Teams such as the Detroit Tigers, the Atlanta Braves, the Montreal Expos, the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Miami

> > players in Jamestown at the Jamestown Municipal Stadium. Today, the history of Jamestown baseball continues at Russell E. Diethrick, Jr. Park.

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
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The Onslaught of Extraterrestrial Objects

There has been a lot of activity in our solar system with recent solar flares and visits of Near-Earth Objects (NEOs). Martz-Kohl Observatory board members, Walt Pickut and Tom Traub will join forces to talk about these recent events in the context of the Earth being a "target.


Solar activity has been high. We've had recent sunspots that produced a solar storm resulting in the spectacular aurora of May 10. Continued sunspot activity has produced more flares and storms causing partial radio disruptions around the world. Tom Traub will discuss the Sun, recent solar events and possible implications.

NEOs such as comets, asteroids, and meteors are objects that have been nudged by the gravitational attraction of nearby planets into orbits that allow them to enter the Earth's neighborhood. Every once in an eon, though, an asteroid or big meteor comes along that could wipe out a city or a

million dinosaurs! Walt Pickut will talk about the different types of NEOs, where they come from, how they've impacted the Earth, and possible future dangers.

This presentation will be live at Martz-Kohl Observatory and available online via Zoom on Wednesday, June 19, 2024, at 7:30pm, EDT. You are encouraged to come to the observatory to meet Tom and Walt and the astronomy team at MKO and join in Q&As after the talk. Tours will follow. Dress appropriately for the weather as if you were outside. If the weather permits, there will be public viewing opportunities. More info: https://martzobservatory.org

The Martz-Kohl Observatory, located at 176 Robbin Hill Rd, Frewsburg, NY, is operated by the Marshal Martz Memorial Astronomical Association, Inc. a non-profit organization devoted to the amateur astronomer. The emphasis of the association is observational astronomy, well-rooted in education outreach and enjoyment of the starry skies.



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Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program 2024

Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) is a program to increase access to fresh affordable produce to older adults in Chautauqua County. The SFMNP is a USDA Ag & Markets program in coordination with Office for Aging Services (OFAS) that provides a coupon booklet of a \$25 value to low-income older adults. These coupon booklets can be used at participating local farm stands and farmers markets.

Older Adults who are 60 years of age or older are income eligible

- Household Size of 1 = income less than \$2.322/month
- Household Size of 2 = income less than \$3,152/month
- Household Size of 3 = income less than \$3,981/month

These coupon booklets are distributed through OFAS between July 1st and September 30th, or until the limited number of booklets are gone. This is a "First Come, First Serve" program with coupon booklets limited to 1 per OFAS has planned distribution locations coordinated with housing units, senior groups, food pantries, churches, and at various summer resource fairs. Call our main line at NY Connects 716-753-4582 to find get more information on where and when these distributions are occurring.

You can also look for an OFAS table at Farmers Markets on:

- Wednesday July 17th at Dunkirk Farmers Market
- Thursday July 18th at Forestville, Mayville, and Lakewood Farmers Markets
- Saturday July 20th at Jamestown, Fredonia, and Westfield Farmers Markets

If you would like to host a distribution location at your church or organization where older adults meet, call 716-661-8940 and ask for our Nutrition Coordinator, Carey Skelton in order to set up a date and time to reach income eligible older adults with this program.

By making simple and healthy choices on a daily basis, you will be well on your way towards achieving optimal wellness. We know the healthy choice is not always the easiest choice, but small changes can make a big difference. Chautauqua County Office for Aging Services offers Nutrition & Wellness programs to help you in your journey toward total wellness.
